THE ROYAL SOCIETY OF BRITISH ARTISTS

"On May 22 1823, certain gentlemen, being artists by profession, met publicly at the Freemasons Tavern in Great Queens Street, Lincolns Inn Fields, to discuss the formation of a new Art Society". This was the first meeting of the Society of British Artists. In 1847 this Society received a Royal Charter and on August 9 1887, it was re-styled The Royal Society of British Artists.

The Founding Members, of which there were 27 and 5 Honorary Members, were most insistent that they did not wish to rival any other Society and every Member . . . "was at liberty to assist and support any other Societies". The British Institution and the Royal Academy were contacted; the King and the Prime Minister were informed. The SBA (as it was then known) was financed by a system of donors not dissimilar to the present Friends of the Royal Academy. When the first £1,000 was raised, John Nash was commissioned to build a gallery in Suffolk Street off Pall Mall. The Haymarket Theatre had just been completed, the National Gallery was not even thought of - such a site in the heart of London with no other Galleries nearby was ideal and this Gallery remained in use until 1971. The First President, Thomas Heaphy, was elected and the first exhibition took place in 1824. This exhibition lasted three months; 220 Non Members exhibited and 754 works were hung. The most popular picture "The Seventh Plague" by John Martin was bought for 500 guineas by Lord Lambton and the Society was off to a good start.

The rules for submission of pictures set up then have remained in force to this day with little change except that in those days there were no submission or hanging fees. Sold pictures were indicated by a black spot — not the universal red spot of today. Women artists — they were increasing in number — were made Honorary Members and were allowed to exhibit with no financial obligation (this practice was not altered until 1902). The hanging of the first exhibition took 15 days and the Hanging Committee were paid a guinea a day. The Council met daily during the exhibition and were fined half a guinea if they failed to turn up.
